VULTURES IN MANIPUR

- > Vultures are found across the world in all continents except Australia and Antarctica.
- Vulture is a patient bird. It is very hardy and have long life span.
- > It can survive in a wide range of habitats.
- In Manipur, three species of vultures were recorded. They are:
 - 1. Himalayan Griffon (Gyps himalayensis)
 - 2. Oriental White Rumped Vulture or White Backed Vulture (Gyps bengalensis) and
 - 3. Red-headed Vulture (Sarcogyps calvus)
- ➤ Vultures are included in Appendix II of CITES (Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species).
- > IUCN (International Union for Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources) has classified them as Critically Endangered.
- Vultures are disappearing from the state due to some probable reasons like:
 - ✓ Habitat loss.
 - ✓ Food shortage,
 - Hunting for their meat and feathers etc.
- Vultures are the best scavenger nature has created and a close friend of man and wildlife.
- > We should love them and stop killing them.
- > We should not allow them to be extinct.

Local Name: Lang-ja Ching-don ta
IUCN status: Near Threatened

Included in Schedule IV of the WPA, 1972.

Identification:


- It is a large size vulture
- the ruff feathers are long and spiky
- overall pale body colour
- downy head
- pale bill
- the legs are covered with buffy feathers.

Distribution in Manipur: Imphal west, Thoubal, Ukhrul and Churachandpur

Recent report was from Ukhrul and Churachandpur district in the year 2012 and 2013 respectively.

Oriental White Rumped / Indian white-backed vulture





Scientific Name: Gyps bengalensis

Local Name: Lang-ja nam-daang, Lang-ta, Lang-tia, Lang-kia etc.

IUCN status: Critically endangered

Included in Schedule I of the WPA, 1972.

Identification:


- Medium-sized vulture with an unfeather head and neck
- · black and white neck ruff
- prominent white rump
- dark bill with pale upper mandible

Distribution in Manipur: Bishnupur, Churachandpur, Imphal East, Imphal West, Jiribam, Tamenglong and Thoubal.

Recent report was from Churachandpur district in the year 2013.

RED-HEADED VULTURE





Scientific Name: Sarcogyps calvus

Local Name: Lang-ja amu-bi or Lang-ja ngak-ngang-bi

IUCN status: Critically endangered

Included in Schedule I of the WPA, 1972.

Identification:

- it is a medium-sized vulture
- it has dark with heavy bill
- reddish head
- pale grey band at the base of the flight feathers
- dull whitish patch on lower back
- dark eyes denote female

Distribution in Manipur: Senapati

- Last reported from Senapati district in 1971.
- Mostly vultures are found in groups or flocks but Red headed vultures are seen solitary or in pair around carcasses.


